

Y5 Termly Curriculum Plan for Parents- Autumn Term 2017

Year 5	
Religious Education	<p>Creation the children will know that there are two stories of Creation in the Book of Genesis. Understand what being made in the image and likeness of God means and the responsibility to use our God given talents. Know some reasons for praising God the creator of the world. Understanding Key beliefs about the creation of the world and the creation of human beings.</p> <p>Miracles and Sacraments of the Sick, the children will know a number of miracles of Jesus and identify how his actions brought change to people's lives. Know about some places of pilgrimage and prayer for the sick. Understand that the Sacrament of the Sick is an important celebration for those who are ill.</p> <p>Advent, the children will know and understand that Christians prepare to remember the first Coming of Christ and prepare for his Second Coming during Advent. They will know and discuss the messages of those who have proclaimed the coming of Christ. We make links with the Old and New Testament as we prepare for the coming of Christ.</p> <p>Christmas, the children will know the main features of the Christmas Story and understand some of the difficulties faced by the different characters in the story. The children will hear about the story of Christmas from St. Matthew's Gospel. We will explore the difficulties faced by Mary and Joseph and the tensions that arose in King Herod.</p>
Maths	<p>Children will learn to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Read, write and order, order and compare numbers to 1 000 000 and determine the value of each digit. • Count forwards and backwards in steps of powers of 10 for any given number up to 1 000 000. • Add and subtract whole numbers with more than 4-digits. • Add and subtract larger numbers mentally. • Solve addition and subtraction multi-problems. • Identify multiples and factors. • Use the vocabulary of prime numbers, prime factors and composite numbers. • Multiply and divide numbers mentally. • Multiply and divide whole numbers and those involving decimals by 10, 100 and 1000. • Solve problems involving multiplication and division. • Estimate and measure angles in degrees. • Draw given angles. • Convert between different units of measurement e.g. kilometre and metre, metre and centimetre, centimetre and millimetre, kilogram and gram, litre and millilitre. • Use and understand metric units and common imperial units. • Use all four operations to solve problems involving measure. • Measure and calculate perimeter and area.
English skills	<p>Children will learn to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue to read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference or textbooks. • Learn a wider range of poetry by heart. • Summarise the main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph, identifying key details that support the main ideas.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments. • Use brackets, dashes or commas to indicate parenthesis. • Use adverbs and modal verbs to indicate degrees of possibility. • Link ideas across paragraphs using adverbials of time, for place and number, including ways to link the introduction and conclusion. • Plan, draft, write, edit and improve their work. • Use the techniques that authors use to create characters, settings and plots. • Make effective grammar and punctuation choices. • Assess the effectiveness of their own and others writing.
Homework	<p><u>Monday – Spelling homework</u> will be sent home to learn based on spelling rule learnt in class. Children should use the ‘look, cover, write, check’ method to learn their spellings. <u>Spellings will be tested on a Friday.</u></p> <p><u>Monday - English homework</u> and <u>Maths homework</u> will be set. Homework is due in on <u>Friday.</u></p> <p><u>Reading diaries-</u> if you could continue to fill these in like last year. I have asked children to aim to read two books each week, but appreciate this will vary depending on the length of the book. The children will have the opportunity to change their library book every two weeks on a Friday.</p> <p>Please encourage your child to write a comment about their book every time they read. The comments might include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Favourite part • Comment on something that has happened • Comments on a character • Opinion of a book • Comments on punctuation and vocabulary. <p>Please be aware that curriculum guidelines state that children should re-read texts to aid fluency and expression and re-read for understanding and comprehension.</p>
